Today, the exquisite masterpieces created by over 2 million Indian Carpet Weavers and Craftsmen, mostly experts artisans, continue to enchant the consumers the world over. Indian Carpets are known for their magnificent designs, intricate patterns, vivid colours and matchless craftsmanship.

No wonder, India has emerged as the largest exporter of handmade carpets in the world with a 34% share of the global markets, reflecting their immense popularity acceptability.

On account of the proactive role, with a membership of over 2000 members and over 20 associations/ business associations/ weavers/ artisans associations', CEPC espouses the shared vision of Indian businesses and speaks directly and indirectly for over 2 Million artisans. It has an expanding direct membership of enterprises drawn from medium, small and tiny segments of carpet weaving/ manufacturing, distributive trade and services. CEPC maintains the lead as the proactive day – to – day business solution provider through research and development, through organizing BSM, RBSMs, participating in trade fairs, expositions / events at foreign shore, interactions at highest level with Union Government and State Governments.

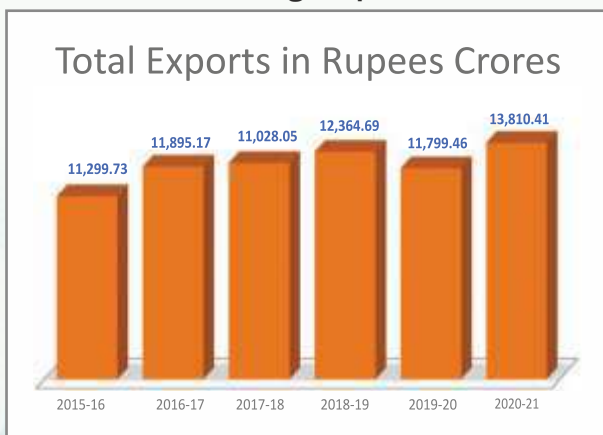




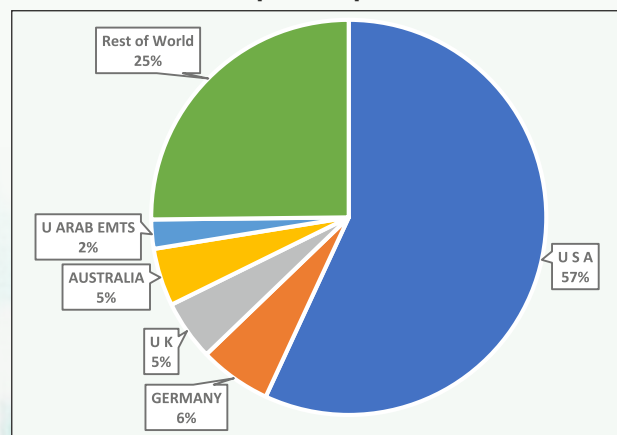
INDIA: A Global Leader in Handmade Carpet

India is today a clear leader in the international handmade carpet market. India's heritage of handmade carpet has been recognized worldwide with a commending share in global exports, for its subtle elegance, eco friendliness and exquisite vibrant color craftsmanship with a human touch.

Key Markets and Potential

India is exporting to more than 70 countries in the world, mainly to USA, Germany, Canada, U.K., Australia, South Africa, France, Italy, Brazil etc. Started exporting to China. USA with 57% share followed by Rest of the World with 25% share (Germany, UK, Australia being leading importers) are traditionally the biggest and established markets for Indian Carpets. Europe however, seems to be stagnant today, with no sign of revival in demand, forcing exporters to find new markets. Scandinavian Countries have an unexplored potential to be tapped. CEPC has also identified some thrust countries for this purpose.

Despite holding the biggest share in Indian carpet exports, USA still promises some growth. It is a dynamic market where economy is doing well. American consumers simply love handmade Indian rugs. Latin American countries like Brazil, Chile, Argentina and Colombia have a large unexplored potential. Brazil in particular has large population and good demand, but the import duties need to become more rational.

The Art & Craft Manufacturing Process

Once the dyed yarn is ready, the designers create carpet designs either by hand or on a CAD. These designs are the reference point for production of all types of carpets.



A warp frame is constructed for Hand-Knotted Carpets. Hand-Knotted Carpets made from Silk and Wool are the most exquisite and labour intensive. Each knot of the complex designs in these carpets is skillfully tied by the weaver under strict guidance of the master weaver. Pre woven fabric is stretched on a tufting loom to produce Tufted Carpets. Tufted Carpets are relatively easier to produce as the yarn is tufted by a tufting tool high frequency. Hand-woven Carpets are dyed or prefinished natural yarns. Post weaving, handmade carpets go through the process of latex fixing, backing, washing, sheering, finishing and inspection before they are ready for export shipments.



India offers one of the largest varieties of designs, weaves, structures and processes for Handmade Carpets. The range consists of Hand-knotted, Hand tufted and Hand-woven Carpets, Area Rugs, Kilims and Durries, all of which follow a unique manufacturing process of their own.

Training and Skill Development

With high socioeconomic importance, the Hand-made Carpets is constantly developing and sustaining its human and material sources, necessary for its long term survival. Foresighted lyrealising this, CEPC, with Indian Government ensures and supports every effort towards an eco-friendly and sustainable the support of the production process.

This includes, several skill development programmes for working artisans and craftsmen, attracting managerial talent and educate them in modern production techniques, bringing in modern designing concepts on CAD, initiating efforts to set up regional common effluent treatment plants, improving quality and consistency management infrastructure to name a few.

CEPC trains women artisans in Jayapur village and its surrounding areas for carpet weaving. Apart from providing a free trainer, necessary training infrastructure and required raw material, every trainee also gets a monthly stipend form CEPC. Trained weavers are then linked with major carpet export houses, who provide them weaving assignments on job work basis. These women take yarn home and weave at home in their spare time thus adding to their incomes. This initiative is helping the industry make-up, at least partially, for the shortage of skilled weavers, which has been is major worry in recent years.



Initiatives on Skill Development and Marketing:

Indian Handmade Carpet Industry is concentrating strongly on Skill Development and is undertaking big Marketing initiatives. Carpets Industry has initiated the Training Centres to enhance the skills of weavers in various Carpet Clusters i.e Bhadohi, Mirzapur, Agra, Jayapur, Gaya, Patna, Bikaner, Jaipur etc and has imparted training to more than 2500 artisans especially women. Presently Council is running Training Centres in Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh, Jharkhand, Odisha, Chattisgarh, Maharashtra, Sikkim, Manipur etc. Council is further exploring new Carpet Clusters and planning to start Training Centres in Jammu & Kashmir, Laddhakh, Uttrakhand etc under the Schemes of O/o DC (Handicrafts) and RPL Scheme of National Skill Development Council. Apart from Carpet Weaving Training, Council will also focus on Design Training to meet international Standard, Soft Skills Trainings of Weavers, Seminar for Artisans to help them become them entrepreneurs.

Indian Handmade Industry undertakes various domestic and international marketing initiatives for helping small and medium manufacturers/exporters for showcasing their products to the overseas buyers.

Under the "Sab ka saath, Sab ka Vikas or Sab Ka Vishwas" Initiative of Ministry of Textiles, Government of India, CEPC also provided carpet weaving looms and work sheds to trained artisans of Jayapur Village, to make them self-sufficient entrepreneurs.



Caring for Society's Largest Community

Indian Handmade Carpet Industry is the largest community in the world with 2 million weavers and their families involved in this unique cottage type occupation.

The office of the Development Commissioner Handicrafts, Carpet Export Promotion Council and individual industry members make constant efforts to improve the quality of life for this large family. Free schooling and playing facilities for the weavers children, free mid-day meals, medical facilities and insurance for the weavers and their families.





CEPC Propelling Growth

Established by the Ministry of Textiles, Government of India to facilitate export promotion and development of Indian hand-knotted carpets and floor coverings, Carpet Export Promotion Council (CEPC) has played its role effectively since 1982.

CPEC channelises communication between the carpet manufacturers/ exporters and the Government on industry matters. It helps the Government plan export promotion strategies, welfare schemes for carpet weavers and action plans for a more organized growth of this skilled craft sector. The council ensures that its carpet manufacturing processes.

CPEC facilitates sourcing for international buyers on one hand and helps Indian exporters penetrate the global markets deeper and wider-both established and emerging ones.

CPEC also provides financial assistance for market development and sourcing. It organises its own trade shows and helps exporters exhibit in various international trade events worldwide. It disseminates information business scenario.

The council has taken several measures for the welfare of artisans and their families, which includes running free schools for their children, medical facilities for the weavers and their entire families, workshops and training for working carpet designers and weavers to upgrade their skills.

CPEC has assumed the role of a catalyst for growth and inculcation of international values quality standard and social compliances.





Region Specific Products



BHADOHI:

Its carpets, in various knots and counts, are famous for their varied range and designs. This belt specialises in Woollen Hand Knotted Persian designs, Indo Nepal, Shaggy, Tufted, Loom Knotted, Tibetan Carpets, Durries and other type of natural floor coverings.



MIRZAPUR:

Besides producing regular Hand knotted and Hand-tufted Carpets in wool, this belt specialises in manufacturing Woollen Durries, Kilims and Loom Carpets.



AGRA:

Famous for one of the wonders in the World (Taj Mahal) Agra is equally known as one of the earliest carpet producing centres in India. The weavers here produce Persian, Turkman and Aubussan varieties of carpets.



PANIPAT:

Is famed for the production of Durries, Tufted Carpets and a wide range of floor coverings including Shaggy Rugs.



JAIPUR:

Well known name in the carpet industry across the World. Its Soft back and Hard back Carpets are high sellers and the place is also known for Wool/Silk flower carpets and Handspun Knotted Carpets.



KASHMIR:

The carpets made here are known for their typically imbued character and skilled craftsmanship. Pure Silk Carpets made in this region are highly regarded as Master Pieces because of matchless designs and craftsmanship. These carpets are woven with 324-900 knots per square inch and even more and are generally inspired by Persian design

Type of Products



SILK

Indian Hand-knotted Silk Carpets are highly valued among the world's best carpet weaving regions. Kashmir Carpets have developed original style with respect to colour, quality, design and durability of their rugs. These exquisite creations are hand-knotted on warp threads, one at a time, in accordance to a strict code of colours and in the order of their appearance in the pattern. The Silk Carpet is very rich, aristocratic, and highly refined. Basically, the more knots per square inch, the greater its value and durability. They are known to last for generations, hold their value or even appreciate over times. Jaipur is another renowned production center in India apart from Kashmir.

INDO-PERSIAN

Originating from Iran, Persian Carpets are woven in India since 15th Century. These carpets are usually hand knotted and use a number of motifs in their design structure. Their design source is primarily flowers, plants, culture, folklore and royal lifestyles. The weaving of Persian Carpets is a complex and laborious as a single carpet can take from a few weeks up to a year to complete, depending on the design, fineness of knots, quality and size. Major production centres for Indo-Persian rugs in India are districts around Varanasi including Bhadohi-Mirzapur Gopiganj. Other centres include Kashmir, Jaipur and Agra.



INDO-NEPAL

Indo-Nepal Rugs portray a unique tradition of tribal and modern designs with the excellent combination of modern trendy colours. The Indo-Nepal Carpet is a simple hand-knotted rug and also a collectors' item, made by artisans in India. The rugs' simple style makes it suitable and coveted for modern interiors. Made by village weavers, these beautiful rugs are unique treasures and usually take months to complete. The continuity of this fusion of traditional and contemporary has made these carpets a product of a living and a thriving art. Major production centres are: Bhadohi, Mirzapur, Jaipur and Agra.



LAURIE BAFT

The exclusive variety of Jaipuri Lori - Baft Rugs is suited for interior decoration. These rugs are made from excellent quality yarn and are beautifully woven with intricate designs. Magnificently designed and woven Lori Rugs are known for its fine finishing and minute detailing. The unique design and pattern of Lori Rugs has garnered popularity in the global market too. Made from hand-spun yarn blend of New Zealand natural wool, the rugs' unique patterns and designs are highly coveted by consumers. The key centres for production of Lori Baft rugs include Bhadohi, Gopiganj, Agra, Mirzapur and Jaipur.





SHAGGY RUGS

Shaggy Rugs are relatively a new category of rugs and floor coverings in the industry. Because of their edgy designs and mostly muted colour palettes, they integrate with contemporary consumers' lifestyle easily. Their appearance is modern and stylish. Over a period of time, these rugs were being made in more intricate designs and were used as floor coverings and prayer mats. The Shaggy rugs once also were a mark of worldwide fashion statement. Faster production and efficient shipping facilities have made it possible for the consumer to now enjoy the comfort and sophistication of a new shaggy rug at a low price. Prominent centres of production include Panipat, Bhadohi and Gwalior.

HAND TUFTED CARPETS

Tufted Carpet is the most common method of constructing carpets today. Created with the use of machinery, tufted carpet has a reputation for being sturdy and wearing well over long periods of time. Several popular styles of carpeting make use of the comfortable pile that is created with the tufting process. The base material in the tufted rugs is pre woven cloth, usually canvas that provides a strong base and much more economical than hand-knotted carpets. Major centres where tufted carpets are made include Panipat, Bhadohi, Jaipur, Agra and Gwalior.



KILIMS HAND

The origin of Kilim Rugs has been traced as far back as 7000 BC. Kilims are produced by tightly interweaving the warp and weft strands of the yarns to produce a flat surface with no pile. Weaves in most of the Kilims are "weftfacing", i.e., the horizontal weft strands are pulled tightly downward so that they hide the vertical warp strands. A good quality Kilim rug today commands a high price. Over the last few years, with increasing appreciation of the artistic weaves of Kilims by the discerning consumers worldwide, they are increasingly becoming collectors' item. These rugs are mostly either used for home decor or as prayer rugs. The prominent locations where they are made in India include Mirzapur, Panipat, Bhadohi and Agra.

SILK FLOWER HAND

Silk Flower Carpets are produced by combining silk and woollen yarns. They are popular as they are cost efficient and richer than wool. In Silk Flower Carpets, Silk is used to accentuate the floral designs and the base of the carpet is woven with woollen yarn, Silk Flower Carpets are also considered to be modern version of Persian Carpets and promise affordability and aesthetic appeal. Regions where these carpets are made in India are : Jaipur, Agra and Gwalior.



Type of Products



ZIEGLER

Ziegler is a unique variety of carpet with historic North West Frontier influence. These unique hand-knotted rugs and carpets are woven from hand spun Gazani woollen yarn, most often in traditional floral designs. Low pile nearing zero and uneven surface are unique design characteristics of these carpets. They blend well with contemporary decors. Ziegler rugs are most often woven in traditional colours like beige, red, rust and brown, but of late more subdued western are also used to meet the taste of modern urban consumers. In India these rugs are exclusively produced in Agra, the city of Taj Mahal.

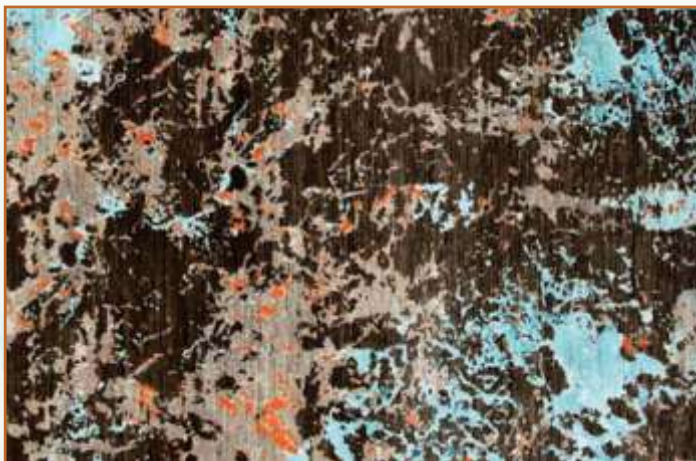
RECYCLED
